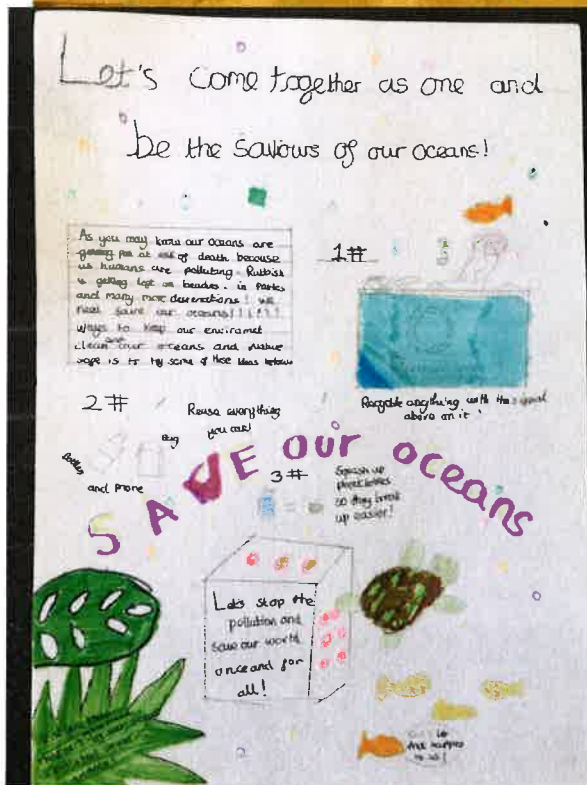
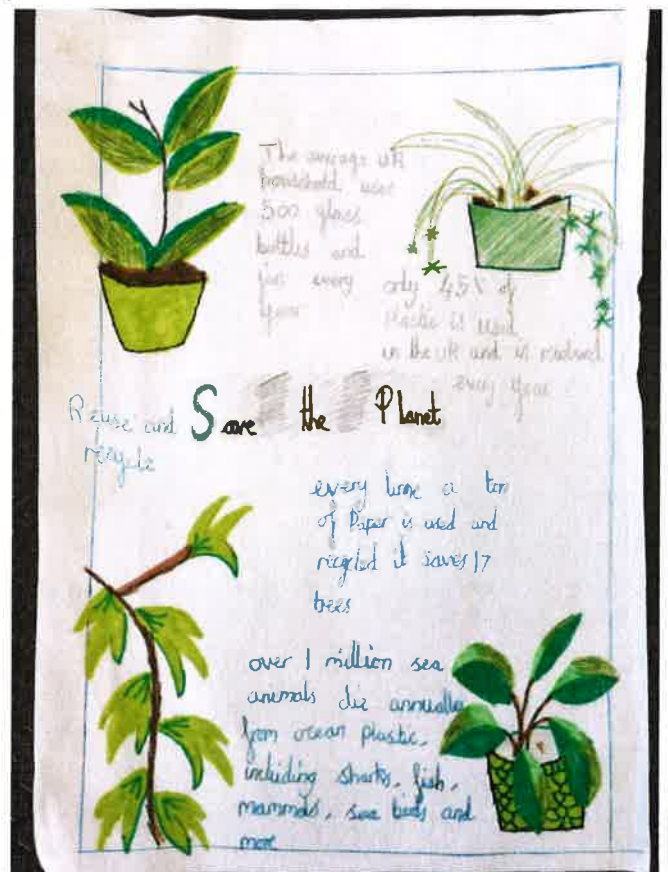
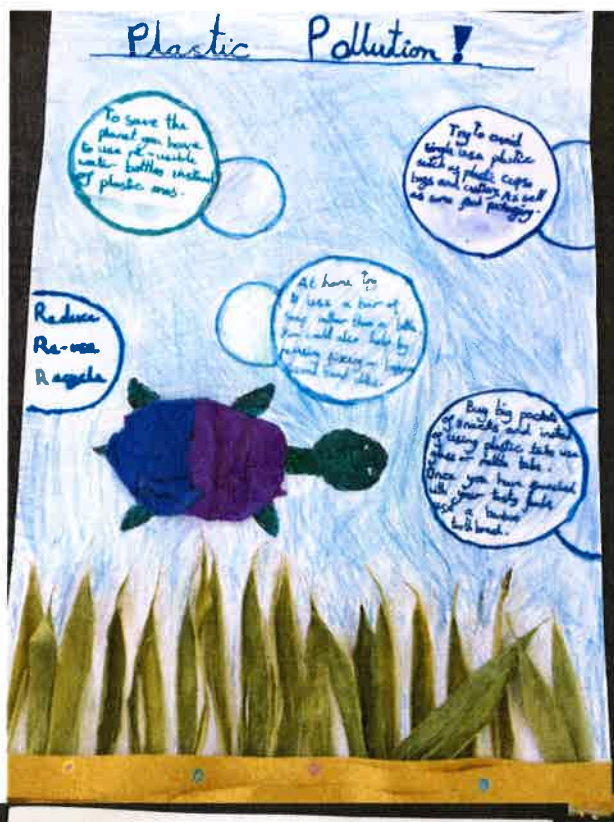

Safeguarding information

Dorset Police - What are county lines?

County lines is the term used to describe urban gangs supplying drugs to other parts of the UK using dedicated mobile phone lines. The gangs are likely to exploit children and vulnerable adults in order to move and store drugs and money. To do this they will often use coercion, intimidation, violence and weapons.

An operating base is an essential feature of county lines gangs. They will regularly exploit vulnerable people, by building up a debt or using threats and violence in order to take over a person's home. This practice is commonly referred to a 'cuckooing'.

Children have been reported to be involved, most commonly involved are 15–16-year-old boys. Children are used to deliver drugs and money between locations. They will often stay in the house that has been taken over through 'cuckooing'. Gangs may also target women who tend to be drug users or have engaged in a relationship with a gang member. They can become victims of sexual and domestic violence and can also be forced into delivering drugs or money for the gang. Vulnerable adults who are in financial difficulties or have mental health problems are usually the most likely victim of cuckooing, and can also become the sellers of drugs on the streets.

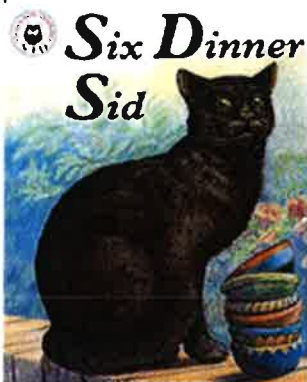
FREE SCHOOL MEALS

Vulnerable people of all ages are being used by drug dealers across the country to courier drugs and money.

They will often force a vulnerable person to allow them to take up residence in their home (this is known as cuckooing) to sell drugs in the local area.

- Have you noticed more people calling at a neighbour's home?
- Often at unsociable hours?
- Have you noticed any suspicious vehicles or people at a neighbour's home?

- Addresses
- Car registration(s)
- Numbers of people visiting the premises
- ...would be very helpful.
