# Glossary

#### What is Fred Talk?

When teaching Read Write Inc. Phonics to your children in school, teachers will introduce your child to a toy frog called Fred once he or she is ready to start reading words.

Fred can only say the sounds in a word and needs your child to help him read the word. Fred will say the sounds and children will work out the word. For example, Fred will say the sounds **c-a-t**, and children will say the word cat. This is Fred Talk: sounding out the word.

What can you do to help at home?

1. Speak like Fred throughout the day

(Can you put on your h-a-t?)

2. Play Fred games

(See suggested Fred games in separate document)

3. Use 'Fred Talk, read the word' to read words.

(c-o-t, cot / sh-o-p, shop / s-l-ow, slow)

## What are 'Special Friends'?

Special friends are a combination of two or three letters representing one sound, e.g. ck, ay, igh, oa. Children are encouraged to look for the special friends when reading to help de-code the words.

#### What is 'Fred in your head'?

Once children can sound out a word, we teach them to say the sounds silently in their heads.

We show them how to do this by:

- 1. Whispering the sounds and then saying the whole word;
- 2. Mouthing the sounds silently and then saying the whole word;
- 3. Saying the whole word straight away.

#### What is perfect pencil grip?

Children sit at a table to write.

They hold up a pencil in a tripod pencil grip with the non-writing hand flat holding their paper.

# Reading

# How do I listen to my child read?

Your child will have a Storybook matched to the sounds and words they know - a decodable book - so they should be able to read all the words.

Please try to avoid saying, "This book is too easy for you!" but instead say "I love how well you can read this book!"

You can remind your child to read words using 'Special Friends', 'Fred Talk', read the word. (See Glossary).

For example 'ship': spot the 'sh', then Fred Talk and blend to read the word e.g. sh, sh-i-p, ship.

#### How can I help my child read Red Words?

Red Words are also known as common exception or tricky words. They occur in stories regularly (said, what, where) but have unusual letter combinations ('ai' in the word 'said' makes the sound 'e').

Remind your child not to use Fred Talk to read Red Words but instead to 'stop and think'.

Tell them the word if you need to.


